The Ten Movement is funded by The Joanie Bernard Foundation, which began in 2013 for the pursuit of life, love and a home for every feline. The foundation supports a network of no-kill cat shelters and groups that provide care for cats, as well as programs and campaigns to encourage adoption and share the benefits of spaying and neutering. Why is it called the Ten Movement? Because cats famously have nine lives. Together, we can give them one more.









Deborah Cribbs is the chair of the Board of Trustees for the Joanie Bernard Foundation, the nonprofit organization behind the Ten Movement and Scooter the Neutered Cat. The Joanie Bernard Foundation works to support a network of no-kill cat shelters and groups providing care, homes and advocacy for cats. If you've ever heard the expression "Cats have nine lives," you understand the purpose behind the Ten Movement – to give cats one more life by

focusing on spay/neuter efforts as the simplest, most humane way to address feline overpopulation.

Cribbs' personal experience has deepened her connection to the work of the movement she leads. She cares for a colony of community cats and is an admitted "failed" foster parent who

fell in love with her foster cat and ended up adopting. She has overseen every Scooter campaign and encouraged her creative team to keep pushing the boundaries to spread awareness for spay/neuter, community cat education, and adoption and fostering efforts. This dedication helps to advance the mission to make Greater Cincinnati a no-kill cat community.

When Cribbs, whose career is in the banking industry, and the board were originally bequeathed the money to form the Joanie Bernard Foundation, their only charge was to improve the lives of cats. Due in part to Cribbs' vision, they have accomplished that and so much more. The Ten Movement has played a vital role in dramatically raising the live-release rate to unprecedented heights in the region – from 37% in 2013 to more than 97% today.

Cribbs believes there is still plenty of work to be done. The Ten Movement continues to fund creative public service campaigns like The Great Debate, as well as those spearheaded by Scooter the Neutered Cat like the recent "Mild Kingdom" initiative for community cat awareness. Past campaigns include "Cat Math" and "Talk to Your Cat About Sex," which have sparked viral interest across the country for their fun, cheeky takes on lifesaving resources.

A devout animal lover, Cribbs resides in Cincinnati with her husband and pets. She and Scooter have no plans to slow down. They will continue educating the public until there is a 100% no-kill nation for cats.





OUR STORYTELLER JOHN O'HAGAN

John O'Hagan is an award-winning commercial and film director. His work is distinguished by his strong visual storytelling and humor. These are the key elements to bring to life the vision behind "The Great Debate," the newest ad campaign from the Joanie Bernard Foundation to educate viewers on the importance of spay/neuter to improve the lives of cats and the people that surround them.

John loves documentaries, interesting stories and great characters. His commercial work demonstrates his love of comedy, storytelling and special effects. Reminiscent of one of John's most celebrated spots, "Cat Herders" for EDS, "The Great Debate" comically highlights the ongoing debate between those who love cats and those who don't. The campaign focuses on the one thing everyone can agree on: Neutering and spaying cats is the right thing to do, no matter if you love them or not. His mastery of the craft, high standards and emphasis on authenticity shine in his work on the new campaign for the Joanie Bernard Foundation.

O' Hagan studied film and photography at Brown University, Rhode Island School of Design and New York University, where he received a Master of Fine Arts degree in directing. His early film work experience included working for directors Spike Lee, Milos Forman, Todd Haynes and David Byrne.

John began his film career by writing and directing the short film "Five Spot Jewel," which won Best Short Film at three film festivals. He then directed the feature documentary film "Wonderland," a humorous look at America's first mass-produced "cookie cutter" community in Levittown, New York. The film premiered at the Sundance Film Festival and went on to win five Best Documentary Film awards and was purchased by HBO. For this film, John was nominated by the Directors Guild of America for Best Direction of Documentary.

He is currently working on "Waveland," a feature-length documentary that follows the journey of an array of different residents of a small Mississippi town. Drawn there to help after Hurricane Katrina, John has filmed a group of individuals intermittently over the years to explore how different people respond to a life-altering event.
